

THE MUSTOAL

This first-of-its-kind musical comedy uses subversive satire, sharp wit and show-stopping songs to convey a fresh and startling look at life with a disability.

Set against the backdrop of a high school reunion, *Most Likely Not To...* upends assumptions about what people with disabilities can accomplish, despite being written off as the most likely not to.

Although one in four American adults lives with a disability, these sorts of ableist attitudes are pervasive, due to deep-seated societal norms that favor non-disabled people. As a result, our world remains wildly inaccessible. *Most Likely Not To...* parodies ridiculous real-world situations arising from ableism and inaccessibility as the characters travel cross-country to reunite with old friends and foes.

The show was written and performed by a group of creatives living with spinal muscular atrophy (SMA) — a genetic neuromuscular disease that is often disabling. Support for *Most Likely Not To...* was provided by Genentech's SMA My Way program, which is an initiative that aims to support all people impacted by SMA by sharing lived experiences and building connections within the community.



A thank you from the SMA community

The setup for *Most Likely Not To...* is not new and not unique to those living with a disability. Many of us may have avoided or dreaded our high school reunions because going might mean facing old bullies, problems and insecurities.

What makes this show special is the SMA community's spin on the story. Never before has a group of people with SMA gotten together to share their most ludicrous stories and then put them into a musical. So many details of my life and the lives of others with SMA are invisible to those outside of the community.

As disabled people living in a world not made for us, people with SMA regularly face absurd scenarios of ableism — discrimination in favor of non-disabled people — and often the perpetrators have no idea that they did anything wrong. The cringey situations in this show have all been plucked from real life. None of them had to be exaggerated.

The point of this show is to spotlight the difficulties of traveling with a disability and

the pervasiveness of ableism. By seeing everyday ableism on stage, our hope is that the audience will stop and consider whether they have ever done or said any of these things themselves.

That is what I want people to take away from *Most Likely Not To...* – to put themselves in these situations. If you laugh, that's great. If you felt a bit uncomfortable, even better. What are you going to do with those feelings?

I want to extend my deepest gratitude to Genentech's SMA My Way program for granting people with SMA a platform to speak about ableism in a space where we typically aren't given the opportunity to use our voices. Having been a model in the program's Double Take fashion show ahead of New York Fashion Week in 2022, I knew that whatever SMA My Way did next would be innovative gold, and I am happy I got to be a part of it.

This is how change happens.

INCLUSIVE LANGUAGE

Inclusive language isn't about saying the "right" thing, but rather about respecting diverse life experiences and being willing to learn from different perspectives. Below are some concepts that may provide a useful starting point for continuing the conversation after today's show.

ableism - a harmful, often unconscious, mindset that devalues people with disabilities, due to deep-seated societal norms that favor non-disabled people.

accessibility - the design of products, devices, services, or environments to ensure independent usability by people with disabilities.

authentic disability representation - the depiction of people with disabilities as whole people, not defined by their disability.

disability visibility - the celebration of differences that is made possible by highlighting disabilities and the people living with them.

infantilizing - the act of viewing or treating an adult with disabilities as childlike, such as speaking only to their caregiver or companion.

inspiration porn - harmful objectification of people with disabilities for the purpose of conveying an uplifting message.

internalized ableism - when a person living with disabilities believes that their disability is something to be ashamed of or makes them inferior.

interabled relationship - a romantic partnership between a disabled person and a non-disabled person.

person-first language - phrasing that emphasizes the person and implies their disability is only one part of who they are (e.g., "people with disabilities"), as opposed to **identity language** (e.g., "disabled people"), which embraces disability as a key attribute, like gender or race. Individuals may prefer one phrasing over another, so it's best practice to ask whenever in doubt.

social model of disability - the idea that disability arises from societal barriers, such as inaccessible infrastructure and ableist attitudes, rather than from the individual.



Making air travel more accessible for people with SMA

As you will see in the performance today, air travel remains unsafe and inaccessible for people with disabilities, especially for those with SMA who use a power wheelchair. Cure SMA has been on the forefront of this issue and is actively working to advocate for real and substantial change. We invite you to join our timely efforts!

Many people with SMA avoid or only reluctantly travel by air due to ongoing challenges, including lost or damaged wheelchairs, injuries during seat transfers and inaccessible lavatories. According to the Department of Transportation, more than 30 wheelchairs and scooters are lost, delayed or damaged on U.S. flights every day.

"Flying does not feel like a means of transportation as much as it feels like a horrible and unfair gamble," said an adult with SMA featured in Cure SMA's 2023 air travel report.

Recently, we shared this report with Congress and the Department of Transportation and organized a Hill Day where 110 SMA community members educated Congress about their air travel challenges. We also engaged SMA community members from all 50 states to advocate for accessible air travel legislation through Cure SMA's advocacy tool, which was supported through a Genentech grant.

Congress is currently considering aviation legislation that includes Cure SMA's recommended provisions: better training for staff who support passengers with disabilities and their wheelchairs, updating accessibility standards and studies on allowing passengers to remain in their wheelchairs in the main cabin.

Finding my identity in stories

There were no disabled girls in my Saturday morning cartoons. There were no disabled girls on the big screen, fighting the bad guys for the greater good.

There were no disabled girls in the background of adventure movies and cult classics. There were no disabled girls in princess movies, even when media executives went out of their way to show that, look, anyone can be a princess! Yes, even you!

It's hard to find your passion in a world that tries to erase you. It's hard to find your passion when, most of the time, disabled people are relegated to hospitals and living rooms.

We don't go to prom. The Force isn't with us. And we certainly don't steal significant historical documents.

But that's a narrative. And a false one at that.

Disabled girls are everywhere. We go to concerts and poetry readings and midnight premieres. We climb mountains and write papers, and sometimes, if we're really, really lucky, we find someone who will take our wild dreams in stride — even the ones that have to do with significant historical documents.

We fall in love. We have families. We stare at the sky and feel, for one blinding moment, that we, too, are made of stardust. We rage and cry and, at the end of the day, we pick ourselves up and do it all over again.

The world tries to convince us that, no matter how loud we scream, our stories are swallowed by the void. But that's a narrative. And a false one at that.
